THE SCIENCE PROGRAM

During 2021-2022, our Science clubs served 2nd through 5th graders at Caring and Sharing Learning School, Cone Park Branch Library, Greater Duval, Kids Count, Resilience Charter school, and George Washington Carver Science Club.

The garden at George Washington Carver Science club was, again, used to not only grow food and herbs but also utilized as a science laboratory. The kids measured the size of worms in their compost bin, harvested food they prepared, they used herbs grown to make teas and salves. They also visited UF's Field & Fork program as well as "Grow hub," where they were given plants to take home. They also visited local parks such as Sweetwater Wetlands, Devil's Millhopper, and Depot Park.

The kids of George Washington Carver went on a field trip to Jacksonville's Kingsley Plantation, they learned about the history of Butler Beach, then they enjoyed a few hours of playing in the ocean afterwards.

The Environmental Ambassadors conducted its 32nd year of summer programming. Students looked closely into water, food and energy issues, and spoke with elected officials about these issues. While visiting the Supervisor of Elections, two of our Ambassadors registered to vote.

Field Trips included two springs: Silver Glen and Salt Springs, kayaking on the Matanzas River, a boat tour along the Silver River, a tour of Gainesville's local lakes and creeks leading to the aquifer sink at Payne's Prairie.

They toured three local farms: Siembra farm, John Nix's farm, and also Butler farm. They also toured and observed the abundance of grocery stores in West Gainesville and the food desert in East Gainesville. They attended a community meeting in historic Porter's Community concerning Housing.

On July 29th, the ambassadors hosted an Inter-generational discussion on Climate change. The event was held at the Thomas Center with Wendell Porter, Nancy Deren, Isaac Auspurg from Young Leaders of Wild Florda, and Evie Baxter who served as Panelists for this event discussion. The event ended with a fantastic dance routine by ambassadors. Evie Baxter and Antonio Brockington, and a climate-change "chant" delivered by ambassador, Cam'ron Reese.
