43rd Annual 5th Ave Arts Festival









This year's event was held April 29th and 30th At Santa Fe's Downtown Blount Hall. Vendors included food, clothing, jewelry, books, art and lots of information. The kids had fun in the two bounce houses on site, along with facepainting and arts and crafts.

The Festival kicked off with the Opening Reception on April 28th at the A Quinn Jones Auditorium. Poets, dancers and singers entertained the 80 plus attendees. The event was sponsored by Delta Sigma Theta sorority (since 1990) and Omega Psi Phi fraternity (since 1998).

During the Opening Reception, Caleb Thomas was awarded the Patricia Hilliard Nunn Cultural Ambassador Award.

Environmental Ambassadors







The Environmental Ambassadors program began June 27th and ended July 28th. The program served 10 students ranging from 10th through 12th grades.

Topics covered were energy, water, food and climate change. Tours included a cattle farm, an organic vegetable farm, the biomass energy plant, solar tours, Leveda Brown Transfer Center, UF College of Journalism, Silver River tour, and a creeks tour.

One example of a food desert tour was in assessing the number of grocery stores in the Millhopper community and Butler area on SW 34th and in all of East Gainesville (east of Waldo Road). There was only one. Ambassadors also got to talk to managers and staff about how much of their products are produced locally. Wards had had the most while some of the products in other stores were shipped from other countries. Ambassadors were asked to look at this as an energy issue.

The Ambassadors visited two universities - Florida Agriculture and Mechanical University (FAMU) and Bethune Cookman University (BCU). At FAMU they met with staff, professors, and representatives from the School of the Environment. There was quite a bit of interest from the Ambassadors in FAMU itself and the Environmental School.

The Youth Climate Summit was held at the Blount Hall and was attended by more than 80 individuals. The Ambassadors took care of 95% of the responsibilities of the Climate Summit including registration, MCing, Speakers, small group leaders, lunch and again the performance. Youth representatives from Caring and Sharing

Greater Duval Summer Sling Program, Young Leaders for Wild Florida and the Green Team from Jacksonville.








CAC Youth Council

This exhibit was created by Samuel Proctor Oral History Program and chronicles Black history, including the Native Americans, during the 1800s.







Climate Summit







CAC sponsored our Climate Summit, along co-sponsors Alachua County NAACP and United Church of Gainesville. The event was held at United Church of Gainesville with keynote speaker Jacqui Patterson from the Shirley Chisholm Legacy Project.

More than 200 people attended, 20 organizations tabled and topics covered during breakout sessions were water, food, energy and health. Each session was led by a Mayor of a local city: Jordan Marlowe, Newberry; Jacqueline Randall, Hawthorne; Jiana Williams, Micanopy; Harvey Ward, Gainesville. Alachua County Climate Advisory Committee and Alachua County Environmental Protection Dept presented the Climate Change Vulnerability Study. It was a 95% Zero Waste event.

Wilhelmina Johnson Center



CAC has been the manager of WJC for more than 35 years. For the first time since we began, the City of Gainesville recommended cutting the funding. Members of the community, along with the Director of CAC, sent emails and made phone calls to City Commissioners. The result was to secure funding for the year. We may need to lobby again next year because, as of now, there are no plans to continue funding beyond 2023/2024.

Programs and activities this year occurring at WJC have included dance classes, workshops, and special events: Lavern Porter Tribute Dancers, Xtreme Christian
